A Letter from the Minister

Dear Friends,

One of the things that I appreciate about a Scottish Winter is how quickly I can feel the increasing daylight. At the solstice, our days are very short, but by mid-January, the change is noticeable. There are other hope-filled reminders as well: snowdrops are the early heralds of Spring's return, with daffodils and wild garlic soon to follow.

Winter in much of the United States is a more severe endurance test: the change in light happens more slowly, and the snow and ice can easily persist well into March. Sometimes it's hard to find signs of hope.

Our personal darkness can track a similar course: sometimes we are in a place of such profound darkness that we cannot sense any hopeful signs of life's return. Our grief, injury, and numbness surround, invade, and stretch before us, seemingly without end.

Some forms of darkness are chronic, and some require professional intervention. Society often passes judgement, or grows impatient with problems that aren't quickly resolved.

When a loved one is caught in an emotional winter, we can be the harbingers of spring: we can bring life, energy, and reminders of joy. We can show up in others' lives, not with a superficial "Cheer up!" or a callous "Get over it!" but with patience, humility, and love.

Sometimes, when the emotional darkness is more Midwestern than Scottish, our challenge is simply to be present with those who suffer. In gentleness and perseverance, we show up again and again, lightening the burden not with our words but with our presence, that those who struggle realise they are not alone, even when signs of life and promise are farthest away.

Our challenge and our calling is to be for one another the promise of Spring, the hope of new life, and the assurance of resurrection; again and again and again, until the Spring of life returns.

Treasurer's Report

At the time of writing, our financial year to 31st December 2019 has just ended, and I have received nearly all the information required before I send our records off to be scrutinised by our Independent Examiner.

My records for 2019 show that total income for 2019 was £160,000 and this was very much in line with that for the previous year 2018. However, included in the above figure are congregational offerings amounting to £123,000 and this source of income continues to drop year on year. This income is the essential element of our Church's being, and if we cannot arrest this decline soon, then our Mission work will be in jeopardy.

Our hall income continues to rise but this presents a false picture as, while income for 2019 amounts to $\pounds 28,000$ our expenditure related to the hall has in the last few years risen steeply so that the net surplus amounts to very little from this source.

Expenditure for 2019 has once again been well contained and shows a decrease of \pounds 5,000 (2019- \pounds 162,000, 2018- \pounds 167,000). Much of this decrease is due to staff salary payments which have been reduced by over \pounds 3,000. but this was only possible because we did not have a Youth Worker on our payroll during 2019. Our Ministries and Mission contributions are set by the Church of Scotland, over which we have no control, and they have increased by nearly \pounds 4,000 to \pounds 79,000 and this figure will remain nearly the same for 2020. This is nearly 50% of our total costs but a review of how these contributions are calculated is under way, although no change will take place until at least 2022.

We have also cut back on other costs, especially for supplies for cleaning the centre and advertising in the Fife Herald, but I am aware that we have cut back so much on costs in the last few years that we are now in a position that we cannot make further cuts without seriously affecting the work of our Church.

When our expenditure of £162,000 is offset against our income of £160,00, we show a small deficit for the year of £2,000 and whilst this is an improvement on that for 2018 which amounted to £6,500 it is never-theless yet another deficit and we cannot go on year on year eating into our small reserves which have accumulated over the past years.

Cupar Cluster of Churches Stratheden Outreach Project

History

Hope Park and Martyrs Church St Andrews have visited Lindores and Dunino wards at Stratheden Hospital for the past 30+ years. It's now a year since they said they were ready to end their service there, and asked us as a cluster to consider taking this on. Jeff, Jim Campbell and I visited with them on two occasions to get an idea of what was involved. We then had a meeting with the Charge Nurses to discuss as to how we would take the project forward. They were very positive about the programme, so we began to strategise how we could take over the leadership in a way that encourages participation from all the local churches.

Looking Forward

As an introduction to our venture we held a Christmas Party in December and a Burns Night on 14th January (probably the first of many Burns Suppers). The format of the evenings is quite simple. We aim to interact with the clients, hold quizzes play music and play games. The evening ends with a simple supper for all which is provided and prepared by us.

We held a meeting for interested people from all the churches in the cluster on 21st January, the result was very encouraging. Including the Ministers and Session Clerks we had a total of 18 people there. We have since added 3 more.

Jim Campbell did the introduction, giving a short history of how we have inherited this from Hope Park and Martyrs Church in St Andrews. He went on to outline our last visit, pointing out that there are between two and four staff on duty at all times.

We have all the equipment from Hope Park, which we have continued to use, but we hope to start updating this as we progress.

The dates are as follows 11th February, 10th March, 14th April and 12th May. We will have a break during the Summer months and start again in September to December.

Please keep us in your prayers.

The most significant repairs are: fixing a leak in the church roof, investigation of a possible leak to gutter of flat roof extension at Parish Centre, faulty fan replaced to one boiler in the Centre's basement, and replacing a fuse for the chandelier in church. However the church and centre have benefited externally with the painting work carried out to the church doors, and windows and soffit/fascia to flat roof extension (at centre). David Farmer fixed ceramic tiles to the ladies and gents WC to repair damage to wall with removal of soap dispensers, our thanks to David.

The major improvement is the upgrading to the carpark at the centre, carried out voluntary by church member Ian Hutchison and his squad of helpers. (See attached photo).

HEALTH AND SAFETY

The Old Parish Centre Fire Evacuation Plan is now up and running and hopefully the majority of you will have received instructions re evacuating the building in an emergency situation.

I cannot stress strongly enough the importance to keep to the slabbed footpath when leaving the centre and heading for the muster point. It would be nice to see pedestrians visiting and leaving the centre to use the pedestrian gate and keep to the footpath instead of taking the short cut over the carpark, only people exiting from cars should be walking in the carpark. The 1974 Health and Safety at Work Act adequately instructs the need to provide (and use) separate access/egress for vehicles and pedestrians.

They used our centre for all the stalls and teas/coffees and hot soup. This appeared to be fairly successful.

The craft group has slowly grown and now has regularly around 15 people coming along every second Wednesday. It's a nice cosy group where we bring along something to do and have a good blether and a cup of tea. At certain times of the year we make gifts to sell and the rest of the time just enjoy our own projects, whatever it may be. Anybody who would like to join us will be made very welcome.

The Kinship Care support group is now going into its 5th year of meeting. This year we have had 4 new carers come along to the group. This year I managed to access £700 which Fife Council generously gave us from their community grants scheme. The Kinship grannies enjoyed a lunch out together just before Christmas, and the Kinship families all enjoyed an outing on December 27th to the Alhambra Theatre in Dunfermline to see Aladdin. We still have money in our kitty which we will keep for out-ings with the children during Summer holidays.

Christmas and New Year over now we are back to the normal week to week groups etc. Monday Lunches are back and fairly busy. Come along and enjoy lunch. There are always a couple of homemade soup options along with a special each week.

You never quite know who God is going to direct through the doors of the Old Parish Centre, so far we've had a Dog First Aid Course which was attended to its capacity of 30 people! It will be interesting to see what else we may encounter during 2020.

Cupar Justice and Peace Group

As usual we have had a busy Autumn and Winter, beginning with a successful One World Week event on Saturday 26 October where approximately forty people heard the Chair of Bell Baxter Global Goals Group speak about the work of the group, particularly in relation to Climate Change. We were very impressed with the enthusiasm and commitment of the pupils at the school. Those attending signed the Christian Aid petition to Boris Johnson about climate policy and also a letter/petition on reducing carbon emissions to Stephen Gethins M.P, Willie Rennie, M.S.P. and Councillors Kennedy, Marjoram and Miklinski.

Over the last few months, members have also engaged with e-campaigns led by charities and pressure groups on this topic, which is obviously an issue of very major concern just now, with fires in Australia and typhoons in the Philippines. Of course it will be a particular focus for us in Scotland in the run up to the COP 26: the 26th session of the Conference of the Parties to the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change to be held in Glasgow from 9-19 November 2020.

In November and December our focus was on the annual Amnesty International Write for Rights Campaign: thank you to all who joined with us.

On a lighter note, we began the new year with our annual Epiphany party, where we enjoyed fun in the form of a very entertaining musical quiz organised by Fiona Findlay, food and fellowship, and we took a collection for Mary's Meals. By the time you read this we will have held our annual general meeting, when we reflect on our activities over the last year, including reviewing the change of format for some of our meetings, and plan for the year ahead.

Fairtrade

Traidcraft Update: This time last year, Cupar Fairtrade group was wondering if we would still be able to run a Fairtrade stall because of the problems that our main Fairtrade supplier, Traidcraft was having. I am pleased to report that their position is much stronger now as a result of restructuring, changing some of the ways that they do business and the support they have had from people like you who have increased their purchase of Fairtrade products. Traidcraft are even beginning to take on new staff to cope with demand. Last year there was a much reduced range of crafts, but indications are that they will be able to increase the range of seasonal crafts for Easter and Christmas 2020. This is good news for the producers who need the income to be able to improve their lives.

As for the future, a framework is emerging, but the details of how it will all happen are still being worked out. One of Traidcraft's core values is transparency. They are looking at this in terms of where our food comes from, the effect of farming practices on our earth, the true cost of our food and how much goes back to the small scale farmers who Traidcraft support. They are starting to make this information available with their Transparent Arabica Coffee. For the first time information about how much farmers are paid, how much goes into shipping, roasting and packing and how much profit is made is being publically published on the front of the packaging. It will also involve challenging big companies to reveal these things too.

Did you know that the average price paid on the New York Coffee Exchange that goes to the growers for non-Organic coffee adds up to about **53p**; for non-Organic Fairtrade coffee, the agreed minimum price is **71p**, and for Organic and Fairtrade coffee, the agreed minimum price is **84p** of the RRP of £4.95 for the Transparent Arabica Coffee, Traidcraft are publicly declaring that their profit is only £0.15, once they have paid **£1.32** directly to the growers who harvested the beans in this coffee and all other costs have been covered. This is for a 227g pack.

The ridiculously low commodity coffee price is currently driving hundreds of thousands of coffee farmers and their families into financial ruin and migration. Coffee plants are being cleared on a massive scale and replaced by cocoa cultivation or other crops. The consequence: **the loss of** **the livelihood of these families**. Although the RRP of £4.95 for the Transparent Arabica Coffee may seem steep to us, is it worth paying less?

Fairtrade Fortnight: By the time you read this, Fairtrade Fortnight from 24th February to 8th March may have started, or even be over, but just in case, look out for Fairtrade events. The P6 classes from Castlehill and St Columba's are organising a Community Fairtrade Coffee Morning with board games and a Fairtrade stall on Wednesday 4th March from 10:30 - 12:00. Please come and support this joint venture.

Cupar Fairtrade Group is planning to get involved with the Storybombing initiative where stories about people whose lives have been improved by Fairtrade will be shared. Look out for the story booklets during Fairtrade Fortnight and beyond and share them with others.

What else can I do? I hope that you tried out the recipe in the last Parish News. Here is a savoury one for you to try:-

Thai Green Chicken Curry Serves 4

Ingredients

4 chicken breasts cut into 1.5cm chunks
2 large onions, chopped; 2 garlic cloves, crushed
400ml can Fairtrade coconut milk
5 tbsp. (approx. half a 285g jar) Thai green curry paste
1 tbsp. fish sauce (optional although traditional)
1tbsp green peppercorns in brine, rinsed and dried (optional)
Zest and juice of 1 lime, + extra for garnish
1 tbsp. cooking oil (or Zaytoun Olive Oil) + 1 tsp sesame oil
1 tbsp. dried coriander leaves
2 tbsp. finely chopped green chillies, seeds removed
4 tbsp. finely chopped fresh coriander leaves
Kilombero rice (white or brown) to serve

<u>Method</u>

- 1. Heat oil in pan and gently fry onions and garlic, add chicken pieces and dried coriander and continue cooking for 5-10 mins.
- 2. Add the thick coconut milk from the can plus green curry paste. Cook for 15 mins stirring frequently.
- 3. Add remainder of coconut milk, lime zest and juice, (fish sauce and green peppercorns if used). Stir until boiling, then simmer on a low heat uncovered for 35-45mins until the chicken is tender and the gravy rich and thick.
- 4. Stir in the chopped fresh chillies and coriander and simmer for 5 mins more.
- 5. Serve with rice. Garnish with lime or lemon wedges and coriander leaves.

For a Vegan option, omit fish paste and chicken and substitute tofu or sweet potato chunks.
